The Disability Law Center of Alaska Announces David Monroe as New Executive Director

Anchorage, Alaska, April 25, 2025—The Board of Directors of the Disability Law Center of Alaska (DLC-AK) is pleased to announce the appointment of David Monroe as the new Executive Director of the organization effective April 25, 2025. David Monroe's appointment follows the announcement of the retirement of David Fleurant, who joined DLC-AK as a staff attorney in 1995 and has led the organization since 2000. David Fleurant is known as a kind and compassionate leader

who has always offered staff members the support they need to be effective advocates. He leaves the agency with a strong legacy of advocating for individuals with disabilities in Alaska.

David Monroe began his legal career as a criminal defense attorney in private practice in 1992. He spent five years working within the Protection and Advocacy system, which DLC-AK is a part of, as an attorney and then ultimately as the Legal Services Director for Disability Law Colorado, in addition to his experience as the Executive Director of The Arc of Larimer County in Colorado. His experience in managing programs and agencies that provide advocacy on behalf of individuals with disabilities is well suited to the challenges of becoming the next Executive Director of DLC-AK.
